Finding Neverland

Born on 9 May 1860 in the small Angus mill town of Kirriemuir, Scotland, James Matthew Barrie had been writing for many years before he created Peter Pan, his most beloved and enduring work.

Barrie studied for three years at Glasgow Academy, later spending time at Dumfries Academy before attending university in Edinburgh. Whilst at Edinburgh, he developed a love of the theatre and started writing theatrical reviews that would lead him to London in 1885. In

London, he would start to write his own novels and plays. His first successful book, *Auld Licht Idylls* was published in 1888. Not long after, in 1891, his novel *The Little Minister* became a best seller, and after its dramatisation in 1897, Barrie wrote mostly for the theatre. At the turn of the 19th century, he was known to the British public as a witty, sometimes whimsical writer for adults.

Yet beneath his flair for comedy, Barrie had a serious and melancholy side. The ninth of ten children in his family, for the first six years of his life James Barrie lived in the shadow of his

glorious elder brother David. But on the eve of his fourteenth birthday, David was killed in a skating accident. Such was their mother's grief that the runtish little James determined to replace the dead boy, trying to become so like him "that even my mother should not know the difference". But in his desperate attempt to replace David, Barrie virtually became him, arresting his own development at the age at which his brother had died. At just 14 - and just 5 feet tall - he stopped growing; he didn't start shaving until he'd turned 24. Half a century later, he privately confided in his notebook, "Long after writing P Pan its true meaning comes to me - desperate attempt to grow up, but can't."

Having turned to literature for comfort, escaping the gloom of his grief-stricken household through popular novels such as Robinson Crusoe, the adult Barrie felt a lasting affinity for childhood escapism, and something of a yearning for lost innocence. When put to creative use it gave him his unique perspective on life and enabled him to conceive such plays as *Quality Street* (1901), *The Admirable Crichton* (1902), *Dear Brutus* (1917) and *Mary Rose* (1920). In his private life it brought him loneliness, fame, frustration, and fortune.

By 1897, Barrie's reputation as a novelist and playwright was firmly established on both sides of the Atlantic. He had married the actress Mary Ansell in 1894 and although they had no children, Barrie already numbered several among his intimates. An early child-friend was the poet W E Henley's four-year-old daughter Margaret, who referred to Barrie as "my friendy". This coyness was compounded by a fashionable inability to pronounce her r's, and the word came out as "fwedny" or "wendy". Margaret died when she was six, but Barrie


immortalised her in Peter Pan by christening his heroine Wendy, thus creating a new name.

Barrie's London home was only a short hop across the road from Kensington Gardens, where he was in the habit of walking his enormous St Bernard dog, Porthos - named in honour of a character from one of Barrie's favourite novels, written by George du Maurier. It was here that he first met George Llewelyn Davies - a spectacularly attractive five-year-old who strolled in the company of his younger brother Jack, their nurse Mary Hodgson, and their baby brother Peter. The attraction was mutual, for Barrie could wiggle his ears, perform magic feats with his eyebrows, and seemed to be remarkably well-informed on the subject of fairies, murders, cricket, pirates and desert islands. At a dinner party later that year, Barrie found himself sitting next to "the most beautiful creature I had ever seen." She was Sylvia Llewelyn Davies, daughter of the aforementioned novelist George du Maurier and sister of the actor Gerald du Maurier (who would later become the first Captain Hook). Barrie learned that Sylvia was married to a young barrister, Arthur Llewelyn Davies, and had three sons: George, Jack, and a baby, Peter. Gradually the penny dropped.

A lifelong friendship was formed, and Barrie found inspiration in the Llewelyn Davies childrens' games and stories, claiming that without the family, "Peter never would have existed." In August 1901, Barrie known by them as "Uncle Jim" - invited the Davies family to spend their summer holiday at his wife's country house, Black Lake Cottage, near Farnham. The Black Lake itself provided an ideal setting in which to continue their exploits, recorded by Barrie with a plate camera. At the end of the holiday he compiled the photos - with captions and chapter headings - into a book, The Boy Castaways of Black Lake *Island*. The introduction to the book is written as if by Peter Llewelyn Davies, who is given author credit on the front cover, even though he was only four years old at the time. The edition was limited to two copies, one of which Barrie gave to the boys' father, who promptly lost it on a train - "doubtless Arthur's own comment on the whole fantastic affair" as Peter Davies later wrote. Although Peter Pan did not figure in the story, many of the other elements were present: a

South Seas lagoon, Indians, and a band of cut-throat pirates led by the fiendish Captain Swarthy.

The Little White Bird was published in the spring of 1902. In a section later known as Peter Pan in Kensington Gardens, Barrie introduces a brilliant child who lives among the birds and fairies, a boy who had "escaped from being a human when he was seven days old: he escaped by the window and flew". Peter had arrived.



The castaway games at Black Lake were put to further use in the shape of *The Admirable Crichton*, which opened the same summer. Barrie spent the following year working on other projects, although "the boy who couldn't grow up" was a constant thought in his mind. Then, in October 1903, Barrie's creativity suddenly overflowed with a deluge of scrawled notes on the subject, and within a week he had begun writing the play. He completed his first draft by Christmas.

After reading a revised version of Barrie's draft in early 1904, his friend Herbert Beerbohm Tree wrote to their mutual friend, and producer, Charles Frohman: "Barrie has gone out of his mind I am sorry to say it, but you ought to know it". But Frohman fell in love with Barrie's "dream-child". His only criticism was the title, The Boy Who Hated Mothers. "Can't we just call it Peter Pan?" Barrie acquiesced,

Peter Pan Fact Sheet

- In 1911, Peter Pan was adapted into the novel Peter and Wendy, and in 1924 the first (silent) film version was released by Paramount Pictures. A musical adaptation was made by Leonard Bernstein's in 1950 which starred Jean Arthur as Pan and Boris Karloff as Hook and Mr. Darling.
- J. M. Barrie was constantly updating the story. The script was rewritten and changed each year, and the annual Christmas versions that we have become familiar with are very much in that spirit.
- The addition of Fairy Dust was a concession to health and safety! The first incarnations of Peter Pan and the Lost Boys were able to fly unaided, but after reports of children injuring themselves attempting to fly from their beds, J. M. Barrie added Fairy Dust as a requirement for flying.
- The original productions were notable for pioneering new stage effects. For instance, in early versions, Tinker Bell was a dot of light that darted the stage focused by a mirror. A 1904 review of the play in The Guardian said: "It is absolutely original the product of a unique imagination."
- The first Wendy house was invented for the 1904 version of the story. It was like a tent because J. M. Barrie needed a house that could be built quickly as Wendy sang the lyrics: "I wish I had a darling house, the littlest ever seen, with funny little red walls, and roof of mossy green."
- The first Peter Pan was played by a woman, 27-year-old actress Nina Boucicault, (pictured right), but the character was not dressed all in green. In early stage productions, Pan wore auburns, tans, browns... and cobwebs. The green outfit was largely a Disney invention.
- Captain Hook is an Old
 Etonian. In the original play,
 Hook's last words are "Floreat
 Etona" which is the motto of
 Eton College. In a 1927 lecture
 about the character, J. M. Barrie
 confirmed that Hook attended
 the famous public school.



- Remarkably, Captain Hook knew of Long John Silver. J. M. Barrie's original story says Hook was a contemporary of the pirate Barbeque Silver's nickname in Robert Louis Stevenson's Treasure Island written in 1883, some 20 years before Peter Pan. Hook was said to be the only man that Silver feared. Barrie and Stevenson knew each other and enjoyed a long correspondence.
- "To die will be an awfully big adventure." Peter Pan's famous line was cut from productions of the play during the First World War. It was also paraphrased by Charles Frohman, who produced the first stage version of Peter Pan, as he turned down a lifeboat seat when RMS Lusitania was sunk by a German U-boat on 7 May 1915, saying: "Why fear death? It is the greatest adventure in life."
- Barrie always wanted a boy to play Peter Pan. He never lived to see it though as the play established a tradition of women playing the part. This was because children under 14 were prohibited from being on stage after 9pm and Charles Frohman thought a man would be wrong for the part. It's also tradition to have the same actor playing Hook and Mr. Darling after Gerald du Maurier successfully lobbied to play them both in the original production. Gerald du Maurier was the Uncle of the Davies children and father of the novelist Daphne du Maurier.

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adding "Or The Boy Who Could Not Grow Up"?. Frohman suggested a further one-letter change, turning Could Not into Would Not, thus transforming Barrie's tragedy into Peter's triumph. Frohman adored Peter Pan from the outset, and commissioned it for the Duke of York's Theatre that December.


Far from his earlier London setting, Peter Pan had now relocated to a magical island filled with many new friends. However, the rehearsal process greatly influenced the direction of the play. Remarkably, Captain Hook did not feature at all in early drafts. He was eventually written in because a five-minute piratical monologue would fill time in front of the stage curtains while the scene behind them was changed from Never Land back to the

Darling's Nursery. But the brilliant Gerald Du Maurier, uncle of the Davies boys, had been cast as both Mr. Darling and Captain Hook, and within days from the start of rehearsals, the front-cloth scene had expanded into a full blown fourth act, with a cast that now included a crocodile and an entire pirate crew. Soon Barrie was substantially expanding the character, adding the actor's insights to create the tragicomic Etonian pirate.

Not every development in this period, however, was creatively motivated. Many came about in an atmosphere of theatrical chaos and impending calamity. The budget could not always stretch to Barrie's ideas, for example his notion that Tinker Bell would be played by an actress behind a "giant reducing lens". Also axed was a scene in which Smee was to be lifted by an eagle and carried across the auditorium, a comic but hardly practical idea. To top it all off, on the evening before the premiere, part of the rigging collapsed and destroyed half the set. Barrie worked all night to rewrite his script, and was forced to change the plot to compensate for lost stage pieces. When the curtain rose on 27 December 1904 at the Duke of York's Theatre it was, unsurprisingly, with an air of trepidation. The entire company knew they were taking a risk, and that this eccentric production could well be a disaster. Barrie took the precaution of instructing the orchestra to down instruments and start the clapping in response to Peter's entreaty "If you believe in fairies, clap your hands". He needn't have worried. The audience's faith was so overwhelming that Nina Boucicault (Peter Pan) burst into tears. The play was an instant triumph, with rave reviews and a cult audience, and by the end of its first run Peter Pan had entered the

The play transferred to Broadway, and became the longest running in the history of the Empire Theatre. It was soon a guaranteed feature of the Christmas season on both sides of the Atlantic, and was put on in London every year until 1940. In 1908, Barrie wrote an additional scene entitled 'When Wendy Grew Up: An After-

thought' which was later included in the final chapter of the 1911 novel Peter and Wendy. In this scene, Peter returns for Wendy years later, but she is now grown up and has a daughter of her own named Jane. When Peter learns that Wendy has "betrayed" him by growing up, he is heartbroken until Jane agrees to come to Neverland as Peter's new mother. In the novel's last few sentences, Barrie mentions that Jane has grown up as well and that Peter now takes her daughter, Margaret, to Neverland. Barrie says this cycle will continue forever as long as children are "innocent and heartless".

By 1911, though, tragedy had continued to play a part in Barrie's personal life. Following the death from cancer of Arthur Llewellyn Davies in 1907,

closely followed by Sylvia just three years later, Barrie adopted the boys in 1910. Five years later, George Llewelyn Davies, who had been the model for the central character of David in The Little White Bird (eerily based on George but named after Barrie's dead brother), had signed up to the King's Royal Rifle Corps and was serving in Flanders. He was killed by enemy gunfire. In 1920, Michael drowned whilst swimming with a friend. Suicide was mentioned. Peter, who had become a successful publisher, never came to terms with being called "the real Peter Pan" all his life, and came to loathe his association with what he termed "that terrible masterpiece". On 5 April 1960, he crossed London's Sloane Square, walked into the underground station and threw himself under a train.

Barrie himself was made a Baronet in 1913 and was awarded the Order of Merit in 1922. In 1929, eight years before his death in 1937, J.M.Barrie gifted the copyright of *Peter Pan* to Great Ormond Street Hospital Children's Charity. In an unprecedented move, the 1988 British government amended an act of parliament specifically in relation to Peter Pan, granting an ongoing legacy for as long as the hospital exists. Thus, in perpetuity, Peter Pan continues to benefit seriously ill children who go to Great Ormond Street Hospital Children's Charity for life-saving treatment every day.






Evelyn Brown - Nibs

Peter Pan Collectibles

If you're a Peter Pan fan, and wanted to start a collection of items related to the story, you could end up spending an absolute fortune on the colossal range of souvenirs, promotional goods, prints and memorabilia that are available.

Many of these were produced on the back of Disney's film version of the story, and the majority of Peter Pan, Captain Hook, Tinkerbell and Wendy figures are based around the animated characters created by Disney's brilliant animators. A quick visit to online shopping websites will show that they feature in all kinds of souvenirs... you can even get a 1953 Walt Disney Peter Pan bar of Beauty Soap, unopened in its original packaging, for \$56.99 at hollywoodmemorabilia.com. Just what you always wanted, huh?

Many people begin their collections with items like stamps or coins – and in recent years, both the Royal Mail and The Westminster Collection have produced some perfect collectors items...

PETER PAN STAMPS

Issued by the Royal Mail on 20th August 2002, this set of 5 stamps were the work of Tutssels design group and produced to mark the 150th anniversary of the founding of Great Ormond Street Hospital for Sick Children.

The stamps feature characters from Peter Pan: 2nd class (19p) Tinkerbell; 1st class (27p) the Darling children against the clockface of 'Big Ben'; E (European rate, 37p) the crocodile; 47p Captain Hook; and 68p Peter Pan about to fly. The Queen's silhouette, value or service indicator are printed in gold at top left, and gold is also used in other parts of the designs.









These were also issued on a First Day Cover, stamped with either an Edinburgh postmark featuring J M Barrie, or one from Hook, featuring a silhouette of Peter Pan.



Today, these are not particularly valuable, and you can pick up a set for just a few pounds. But in a few years' time...





PETER PAN COINS

The world's first Peter Pan fifty pence coins have added a little sparkle of fairy dust to collectors' wallets since they were launched in 2019, exactly 90 years since J.M. Barrie gifted all future rights of the book to Great Ormond Street Hospital.

The coins were initially on sale from The Westminster Collection for £6.25 each, or £37.50 for the set of six, and demand was huge, with thousands of people in the queue to buy them online... which is not surprising, as only 25,000 of each design entered circulation in the Isle of Man - where it is legal tender, unlike the rest of the U.K.

The rarest 50p piece in circulation is the 'Kew Gardens' design, released in 2009, which had a circulation of 210,000 coins. Today, it sells for over ≨200... which probably makes the Peter Pan set quite collectible!

AND, IF YOU'RE QUITE RICH...

Sitting in tenth place in the list of the world's most valuable children's books - behind such classic first editions as J.R.R. Tolkein's *The Hobbit*, J.K. Rowling's *Harry Potter and the Philosopher's Stone*, Roald Dahl's

Charlie And The Chocolate Factory, Maurice Sendak's Where The Wild Things Are and A.A. Milne's Winnie The Pooh - is a first edition of Peter Pan in Kensington Gardens, from 1906. Arthur Rackham provided the illustrations, and it's the artwork that makes this book so appealing to collectors of children's books.

The most expensive copy – a first edition signed by Arthur Rackham – sold for $$\pm 4,505$ in 2016.


