




# WELCOME

...to Altrincham Garrick Playhouse, and the ultimate production of our 2021-22 Season, Tim Firth and Gary Barlow's Calendar Girls The Musical.

The inspiring story of the 12 members of the Rylstone & District Women's Institute in Yorkshire who took off their clothes to produce



The dynamic of Tim Firth and Gary Barlow's collaboration on Calendar Girls The Musical was unusual. Tim would send Gary a line indicating a facet of the woman's character, such as 'So, I've had a little work done' or a title such as 'Mrs Conventional' or an anthem to 'Yorkshire' and Gary would set about writing a 3 minute song about that. Tim would then take all the songs that Gary produced and mix and match them - a verse here, a chorus there - to create new compositions to fit the story of the piece. The result is a musical score that is a patchwork quilt of songs that incorporate different bits of different songs, a genuine mixture of Tim's and Gary's music and lyrics. Tim calls it a "Village Green Musical" in that it is as much about the life and the people living in a small town as it is about the extraordinary story that took place in it. Overall, this is a modern musical-comedy with both heart and soul that, we anticipate, will have you laughing one minute, and then holding back the tears the next. As Director, I'm thrilled to have had the chance to work alongside Mark Goggins and with such a great company, both onstage and behind the scenes, on what I hope will be a hugely enjoyable show.

Calendar Girls, The Musical marks the end of a long, occasionally challenging, hugely rewarding year of theatre in which we've been delighted by the overall positive feedback and support that we have received. Following the resumption of 'normal life' after the pandemic, many theatres have struggled to re-connect with their audiences, and this hasn't been helped by the recent steep rises in the costs of living. We are constantly aware of trying to find the right balance, both in terms of ticket prices and the make-up of what we offer on our stages. Later in this programme you'll see details of some of the truly fabulous productions that we have planned for the 2022-23 Season, and once again we've endeavoured to offer 'something for everyone', with contemporary and classic dramas, comedies, musicals, shows for all the family, and an LBGTQ+ themed series of productions in our Studio Theatre. We would encourage you to book early for all of these productions - tickets are on sale now - and you could even save money by becoming one of the Friends of the Garrick, which would quarantee you discounted prices. What's not to like?

It's interesting to note that, over the course of the last year and including this week's show, 140 different people will have appeared onstage in Altrincham Garrick Playhouse productions\* this season, with many of them having made their debuts with our company. I'm proud that we are an organisation that is able to give opportunities to many talented people of all ages and backgrounds. The establishment of the Garrick Ensemble, which both complements the Garrick Academy and provides the next step for graduates from our hugely popular young people's group (\*who had a further 110 pupils appear in Alice In Wonderland Jr. and The History Girl), has been a great success. Simultaneously, while there has been a large turnover of acting talent within the company, it has been great to welcome back a host of familiar faces and 'Garrick stalwarts' alongside the new recruits. Any theatrical organisation is only as good as the people it involves. I'm heartened to say that, currently, we are blessed!

I sincerely hope that you enjoy tonight's production. Many thanks for supporting us, have a safe journey home afterwards, and we look forward to welcoming you back to 'the jewel in Altrincham's cultural crown' very soon!

# THE MAKING OF CALENDAR GIRLS

It is bitterly ironic that the story of the Calendar Girls, which has generated so much pleasure and enjoyment, should have opened with the kind of shattering news which we all dread. John Baker, an apparently fit and healthy 53-year-old "who'd never had a day's illness in his life" according to his wife, Angela, was diagnosed with non-Hodgkin's lymphoma in February 1998. John's many friends in the close-knit picture postcard village of Cracoe were shell-shocked and they rallied round Angela and her family, determined to do something positive to help.

"John was the first of our group to contract a serious illness," recalls Angela. "We were all members of the WI and the subject of the WI Calendar would come round every year. We were talking about it one night over supper, before John became ill, and I remember one very funny half-hour when Tricia suggested that we do our own calendar in the style of the Pirelli one and we all discussed which months we would be..."

After his diagnosis, John's family coped by focusing on short termgoals. Georgina, John and Angela's daughter-in-law, suggested that they should give everyone they knew a sunflower plant to grow in the

hope that, when the flowers bloomed, John would be in remission.

"John was treated in Airedale Hospital by Ann Cuthbert - in the end they couldn't do any more for him. John wanted any chance that he had, so he went to Leeds where he was treated by Graham Smith, Sister Rose and a group of amazing nurses. John at this stage was too poorly to have too many visitors so it was mainly family who came, but my close friends Tricia and Lynda were fantastic".

"He had one good night at home. He wanted a steak and a pint and because of the problems of cleanliness we took one of our glasses down to the pub to be filled for him. Tricia had decided to resurrect the calendar idea, partly to raise money for Blood Cancer UK (Leukaemia & Lymphoma Research as it was then) and partly to entertain John, and it was that night when he and the girls really talked about it. John said "It's

a fantastic idea, but you're all talk - it'll never happen!".

In the event, the rapid decline in John's health added to the sense of unreality which Angela felt. Tragically, after only five months' illness, he died at the age of 54 on 22 July 1998 – before the sunflowers were in bloom. Then one day, a few weeks after the funeral, Angela received a visitor.

"There was Tricia, armed with her clipboard. "Come on", she said. "Are we going to do this calendar or not? Even if we don't sell any, at least we'll have tried to do something."

The whole village wanted to do its bit, and Tricia and Angela recruited volunteers from the WI - one lady who "only came to the meetings if there was a good speaker" found herself enlisted. They had originally planned a print run for the calendar of a mere 1,000, selling them at  $\pounds 5$  each to raise  $\pounds 5,000$ , but the selected printers - Bermuda Print - pointed out that this was not a financially viable proposition, and persuaded them to increase the order to 5,000. Donations from individuals and local businesses took care of the printing costs. All

that remained was for 11 good women and true to bare all in a noble cause.

Accordingly, on a dark October night in 1998, ten shadowy figures arrived at the home of local artist Terry Logan and his wife, Lynda, who was due to pose as Miss July. Although Terry was better known as a landscape painter, he'd worked in advertising for J. Walter Thompson in Canada and therefore he knew precisely what was required.

"I'd set up everything in advance and had worked out what I wanted




from each photograph. I tried to match each lady to her strengths. Angela played the piano, for example, and so I shot her at a piano. If the lady had good legs, I made sure that we saw her legs. At first, the ladies stood around in their dressing gowns, drinking red wine, and I knew that if I waited any longer, some of them would try to bottle out. So finally I said to them. This is it, ladies - let's get to work:"

Initially, there was some resistance to having a male presence in what should have been a female preserve. "I stood in another room and shouted instructions to Lynda but we soon realised that this wasn't going to work. So Angela finally said 'Forget it - let's get it done"

Terry made sure that each picture included a sunflower on each as an emblem of the Calendar Girls.

Over the next six months, everything was geared to the production of what would be one of the first calendars of the new millennium, Seven of the 11 images required were secured on that October night and the remaining four were subsequently wrapped up.

When Angela saw the final printed calendar for the first time, she



cried. It was the first time that she thought it was going to sell.

"Four of us went to the Women's Institute HQ (where we were surprised not to be served tea and cakes), to show them the calendar. We'd deliberately put the word 'Alternative' on the front in case W.l. didn't like it - but, unlike in the later film, they loved it."

In order to coincide with the Annual Conference of Leukaemia Research in Leeds, the press launch was arranged for 12 April 1999 with the considerable help of the brewery which owned the village pub. The girls thought that it would be quite a small affair, so they had arranged for a few bottles of wine and some nibbles to be served. However, the girls had broken their own press embargo (they didn't know what one was in those days!) and heard Terry Wogan talking about it ahead of the launch.

Tricia takes up the story: "The launch was unbelievable. We had invited family, friends and a few sponsors, and we only had a hundred calendars ready. We thought that the launch would be over in a couple of hours. In fact, the pub was packed and the media reaction was huge. The pub car park was packed with white vans with satellite dishes, men holding furry sound things and cameramen everywhere. We had imagined a few people turning up, but the whole place was packed and we could hardly push through the crowd. The calendar made the Six O'Clock News on the BBC; it was on Sky, News 24 and the next night made the main evening news in Australia. It was fantastic to think that we were selling hundreds of calendars and making money for the Leukaemia Research Fund."

# TIM FIRTH & GARY BARLOW

Some years ago, the musician and choirmaster Bob Howes started an annual songwriting competition called 'A Song For Christmas' as part of the BBC's early-evening flagship programme Nationwide.

Tim Firth had entered the competition so many times as a child that he had become friends with Bob Howes. In 1986, while Tim was studying at Cambridge University, he was called back as a judge. Among the contestants that year, claiming the number-two slot with a power ballad called 'Let's Pray for Christmas' was a 15-year-old Gary Barlow. They became friends, not least because they realised they had been born within 20 feet of each other and had both been educated at Frodsham High School, even though they had never previously met. They said they'd keep in touch and maybe try a little collaboration one day – possibly write a musical together...

Tim went on to become a hugely successful playwright and composer. His musicals include Our House (Laurence Olivier Award Best Musical) and The Flint Street Nativity. His plays include Neville's Island, The Safari Party and Sign of the Times. His play, Calendar Girls (Whatsonstage Best Comedy), became the most performed amateur play in history and has funded research projects into blood cancers. Tim's films include Blackball, The Wedding Video, Calendar Girls (British Comedy Award) and Kinky Boots. For television, he wrote Timeless, Money for Nothing (Writer's Guild Award), The Rottentrolls (BAFTA Award), Cruise of the Gods, The Flint Street Nativity and All Quiet on the Preston Front (Writer's Guild Award: British Comedy Award, RTS Award).



One of the first things Tim did after leaving university was go to see Gary performing at Manchester Apollo. This is because in the meantime Gary had formed a band called Take That together with Mark Owen, Howard Donald, Jason Orange and Robbie Williams. They went on to become one of the biggest British bands of all time. Now, after 25 years in the business, with over 52 million records sold including nine UK No.1 albums, 15 UK No.1 singles, seven million concert tickets - and as well as being the proud recipient of six Ivor Novello Awards - Gary Barlow is regarded as one of Britain's most successful singer-songwriters.

It was actually Gary Barlow's mum that brought the two together. She was such a fan of Tim's play *Calendar Girls* that she saw it three times. On the third occasion she took her son, who arranged to catch up with Firth in the interval. That's when it struck them that this was the musical they needed to do together.

By March 2014, they were ready to test out the fruits of their collaboration. And where better to give it an airing than Burnsall Village Hall, where the late John Baker had performed with his amateur dramatics company? They gave a handful of work-in-progress performances to an audience of 75, among them the original WI calendar stars. It met with standing ovations every night.

In 2016, Gary and Tim performed a song from *The Girls* at The Royal Variety Performance backed by a massed choir... whose choirmaster was Bob Howes!

"The story was all over the news and the initial run of calendars we'd had printed were snapped up. So the calendars were re-printed... and re-printed again. The pub eventually shipped 56,000 calendars, putting on extra shifts and not charging a penny!"

By October, the girls were receiving 400 letters a day and they couldn't keep up with the demand, so the Post Office stepped in to help. Roy, the local postman, was recognised later for the part he played in the calendar's success: he was invited to Clarence House to have lunch with Prince Charles and Camilla. It was the first time he'd ever been out of Yorkshire!

Then there was the question of what to do with the money they'd raised. Some of the girls had already climbed the Three Peaks in memory of John, and had asked Ann Cuthbert at Airedale Hospital where the money should go. She recommended Blood Cancer UK. So the girls presented a cheque for £322,000 to the charity and thought that was it... But as everyone knows, it wasn't!


There followed a media blitz, further interviews and appearances on radio and television, three trips to the United States where they sold calendars at the Rockefeller Center in New York, an appearance on The Tonight Show With Jay Leno in Los Angeles (flying there in first class, all expenses paid, thanks to Richard Branson) and even a visit to Buckingham Palace to satisfy a calendar order from a very important customer. The potential for a film was spotted by Suzanne Mackie who, along with co-producer Nick Barton, ultimately brought in Tim Firth, an appropriate choice for all kinds of reasons.

"I'd been going on family holidays to that part of the Yorkshire Dales since I was a tiny child" reveals Firth. "Not only that, but I had actually bought a calendar at the fete and had it hanging opposite me for a whole year. When the call came, I had to rescue it from the bin where most out-of-date calendars end up. The calendar had been staring me in the face for a year and yet it had never occurred to me to make it the subject of a film. Sometimes ideas have to slap you on the face before you realise their potential."

The film was directed by Nigel Cole who, according to Firth, made the film in the exact spirit of Terry's photos, 'with an eye for both the beauty and the comedy of the situation'. Released in the autumn of 2003, it went on to gross more than £20m in the UK alone. After opening in 2008, Tim's stage version of Calendar Girls was soon breaking box-office records and heading out on its first six-month tour. By the following year, it had transferred to the West End, where it took nearly £35m at the box office and played for 158 weeks. Its popularity didn't end there. With the commercial tour over, the producers released the amateur rights for a limited 18-month window. Nearly 800 companies leapt at the chance to stage it, clocking up over 2,500 performances between them.

For those who were there at the start, it's been an extraordinary story, as Angela explains: "I think that we've all coped really well with what has happened. We've done the most amazing things but we've kept our feet on the ground, and we've never forgotten why we did what we did. We didn't do the calendar because we wanted to be famous but because we wanted to raise money in John's memory. It has been the most marvellous experience".

Every person in each seat of the Garrick this week adds to the millions of pounds that the Calendar Girls have raised for Leukaemia Research (now called 'Bloodwise'), as the charity goes on collecting a royalty from productions of this musical. Thank-you everyone!

## Joseph **Meighan Director**

Joseph is the Artistic Director at Altrincham Garrick Playhouse and trained at Mountview Academy of Theatre Arts in London. He has worked as a Theatre Director, Producer and Actor in both Manchester and London, and his love for theatre began at the age of four when he

joined The Helen Donohue School of Speech and Drama.

Directing credits include *The Jury* (Upstairs at the Gatehouse/ Off-West End, London), *Our Town*, *Anne Boleyn*, *Into The Woods* (Kingsley Theatre, Pendleton), *Guys & Dolls*, *Scrooge! The Musical*, *The Phantom of the Opera*, *Les Misérables* (Eccleston Theatre, Pendleton), *Parade*, *A Chorus Line*, *GHOST*, *Chicago* (Waterside Arts) and many more.

Directing credits at Altrincham Garrick Playhouse: *People, Priscilla:* Queen of the Desert, Annie, Romeo & Juliet, The Phantom of the Opera, The Crucible, The Secret Garden, Disney's The Little Mermaid, The Last Five Years, CHATROOM, Curtain Up, Peter Pan, One Flew Over The Cuckoo's Nest and, most recently, Jumpers for Goalposts.

Joseph is the Founder and Artistic Director of MYT Productions in Manchester, and was the Associate Theatre Director for three seasons at Pendleton School of Theatre. He also has a keen interest in Choral Music and was the Choral Company Manager for a number of Choirs for several years, where he would annually produce Concerts in Cambridge.

Joseph trained as an actor and his theatre credits whilst training include *Craig* in *Fanatical - A New Musical* (Workshop and Karamel Club), *Reverend Parris* in *The Crucible* (Arcola Theatre, London). After graduating, he appeared as *lan* in *Might Never Happen* (UK Tour).

He also regularly works as an acting coach and for the past few years he has trained actors at different stages of their careers.



### Mark **Goggins**Musical Director

Mark is the Course Leader of the BA (Hons) Music Theatre degree at UCLan where he also directs the award winning University

Mark has directed many UCLan Music Theatre productions including *A Little Night*

Mark has conducted at many of the leading UK concert venues including The Royal Festival Hall, Birmingham Symphony Hall and the Bridgewater Hall, Manchester, where he has performed with the Hallé Orchestra.




#### Mark Watkins - Ensemble


